Scholarship Essays

College applications, and sometimes job applications, often require you to write an essay on suggested topics. It is important for you to be prepared to either write by hand or use a computer to complete these essays. This means you will need to think about your life experiences, strengths, challenges, and dreams and put your thoughts on paper.

Here is a list of essay topics that are commonly used on college applications. To be prepared, you should think about responses to each one, begin writing ideas for each one, and write an essay response to each topic. Then, you should regularly review each topic and your writing so that you will have something in place when it comes time to actually use these essays in the future.

Common Essay Topics for College Application

- 1. Describe an activity, issue, or idea about which you are passionate and explain why it means so much to you.
- 2. Review a book that has special significance for you. It should not be a book that you read for school, but rather something you read on your own. In your review, please explain what attracted you to the book and why you would recommend it to a friend.
- 3. Describe examples of your leadership experience, in or out of school, in which you significantly influenced others, helped resolve disputes or contributed to group efforts over time.
- 4. Describe a challenge you have faced, how you met it, and its effect on you.
- 5. Describe an event and the significance it has had in your life.
- 6. What are your academic/professional goals?
- 7. A person, event or circumstance that has influenced you, and how it impacted your life. This may include a rewarding or unforgettable experience. (This may be the most used essay topic.)
- 8. Why are you interested in the college to which you are applying? Why do you want to come here?
- 9. Local, national or international issue and why it is important to you.
- 10. Favorite teacher, or class, and why.
- 11. How would you describe yourself as a human being?
- 12. Do you believe there's a generation gap? Describe the differences between your generation and others.
- 13. What does a college education mean to you? What do you plan to do with your college degree?
- 14. How would your friends characterize you? Look at yourself from the outside.
- 15. Choose a prominent person (living, deceased, or fictional) that you would like to interview and explain why.
- 16. What is a major achievement in your life? Who and what assisted you in reaching your aim?
- 17. What are the most important extracurricular or community activities? What made you join these activities?

Sample Scholarship Essay

Below is an example of a real essay from an 18 year old female who has Attention Deficit Disorder, Anxiety, Depression, Central Auditory Processing Disorder, and Visual Processing Disorder. She applied for several scholarships and did receive one where she used this as her actual essay (no edits have been made).

Now as a senior in high school, I realize this process has brought me to a place where I, too, want to empower high school students to share the gifts and skills they have for the enjoyment of others through theater. I also look forward to the opportunity to model and coach high school students to encourage one another in the way that I was encouraged.

As a teacher, my role will include being a coach, motivator, mentor, and friend. As a coach, I will instruct and direct the students toward enlightenment. I will also motivate the students to work hard, encourage them to continue to stay in school, and empower the students to be successful.
